Seeking Refuge- Birds and Landscapes of the Pacific Flyway

How have people affected animal migration? How have they developed landscapes to sustain migration, both now and in the past? Wilson will lay out an approach for studying migration in environmental history by drawing on his research about the past management of migrating birds and wildlife refuges in western North America. He recently finished a book on this subject titled *Seeking Refuge: Birds and Landscapes of the Pacific Flyway* (University of Washington Press).

Wilson earned his doctorate at the University of British Columbia in 2003. He has held a National Science Foundation postdoctoral fellowship at Montana State University and was a recent visiting scholar at the Bill Lane Center for the American West at Stanford University.

Duties: Basic data collection on trees and other vegetation on mountain slopes. Hike to and from field sites. Occasional camping near more distant field sites may be necessary. Fieldwork continues in all but most extreme weather conditions. Rugged field clothes and personal gear required (provided by crew).

The Cape Cod Commercial Hook Fishermen's Association (CCCHFA) is a community fisheries organization that aligns protection of the oceans with the economic interests of our historic fishing community. We currently have an opening for a part-time **Fishery Data Analyst**.

CCCHFA is a progressive leader that promotes stewardship of coastal ecosystems through education, research, and policy programs. Started in 1991 by a small group of Cape Cod commercial hook and line fishermen, CCCHFA quickly developed into an organized voice for local fishermen. Their theory was simple: that responsible fishing practices and conservative regulations would generate healthy fish stocks and revitalize the region's ailing fishing communities. CCCHFA supports a local fishing cooperative. The cooperative is assembled to locally organize the catch of nearly 2 million pounds of cod and other groundfish (like haddock and flounder).

The Fishery Data Analyst will be contracted immediately to work with CCCHFA staff and fishermen members of the harvesting cooperative. Contract Description - Fishery Data Analyst

CCCHFA seeks a knowledgeable, enthusiastic and independent candidate to perform the duties of a Fishery Data Analyst. The Fishery Data Analyst will lead collection of fishery data including catch, bycatch and other important statistics. For instance, on each day, 20-30 fishermen on Cape Cod may set sail to go fishing. The Fishery Data Analyst will receive data flows from local fish dealers and other sources that must be reconciled for 17 different species on each one of these fishing trips. All fishing data must be tracked, checked for accuracy, and reconciled in near real-time. Responsibilities would include comprehension and analysis of real-time and historic fisheries data. Analysis and reporting may include the application of GIS and other mapping.

Candidate would be expected to work 10 to 20 hours per week on average, understanding that some weeks may involve minimal work while others would require 30+ hours of time. Additionally, the candidate would be expected to provide performance reports to Fixed Gear Sector members at bi-weekly sector meetings or as needed to maximize the harvesting performance of the Sector.

The candidate should be independent, responsible, self-motivated, task-oriented and able to work extended non-traditional hours when necessary. It would be preferred if the candidate were working extensively out of the CCCHFA office; however, a remote hire is possible provided that the candidate be committed to maintaining daily contact with the Manager, and that the candidate had reliable internet and phone access.

The successful candidate will demonstrate excellent analytical and quantitative skills; the ability to work effectively with a diverse group of people and maintain an upbeat and positive attitude. Candidate must hold a Bachelors Degree in environmental or fisheries science, accounting, statistics, or have other related field and/or equivalent work experience.

Scope of Work:

- Learn to use CCCHFA's custom software in order to compile data feeds, run standard reports from the software, map hotspots, and export data for further analysis.
- Create and maintain a database for additional analysis beyond the software capacity. This includes but is not limited to bycatch rates, spatial and temporal performance, gear configuration, catch-per-unit-effort, economic return, and other data as required by the Manager.
- Provide performance reports to the Fixed Gear Sector members at periodic meetings or as needed.
- Develop analyses and indicators to identify maximum harvesting and operational effectiveness, and minimize inefficient harvesting practices; apply to real-time Fixed Gear Sector data to create regular reports.
- Develop and maintain familiarity with all aspects of Fixed Gear Sector management and fishing operations in order to understand the data and analysis needs.
- Create templates for common analyses to guide database developers in adding the calculations and reports to the Sector Manager Tool.

- Ability to process fisheries-related data, including spatial and temporal components
- Ability to translate complicated statistics into simplified language for Sector members
- Excellent time-management and organizational capabilities
