Senator Mitchell represented Maine in the U.S. Senate from 1980 to 1995. He led the 1990 reauthorization of the Clean Air Act and was the author of the first national oil spill prevention and cleanup law. He became Senate Majority Leader in 1989. During his tenure, Senator Mitchell earned enormous bipartisan respect. It has been said "there is not a man, woman or child in the Capitol who does not trust George Mitchell."
