In this course we will examine a number of responses to liberal democratic doctrine in the lateeighteenth and nineteenth centuries, coming from a variety of perspectives—conservative (Burke), liberal-progressive (Mill), radical left (Marx), and what might be called radical right (Nietzsche). In addition to Marx's and Nietzsche's radical critiques of liberalism, we will also consider Tocqueville's more sympathetic critique.
