Allen Memorial Scholarship Fund has been established by Giuseppina "Dolly" Allen, in memory of her husband, a loyal member of the Class of 1943. After serving as a pilot in the Naval Air Corps during World War II, Dr. Allen graduated from Bowdoin College and Yale University School of Medicine. As a family physician and chief of medicine at Huggins Hospital, he served the community of Wolfeboro, New Hampshire, for nearly forty years. Having delivered more than 2,000 babies, Dr. Allen was voted Wolfeboro's Citizen of the Year upon his retirement in 1986. He then practiced emergency medicine in Tucson, Arizona, until 1991, when he returned permanently to Wolfeboro. He died in 1998. In awarding the scholarship, preference will be given to Bowdoin undergraduates majoring in chemistry and/or those preparing for a career in medicine.
