CHIMAMANDA NGOZI ADICHIE

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie grew up on the campus of the University of Nigeria, Nsukka, where her father was a professor and her mother the first female registrar. She entered the University to study medicine and pharmacy, but

left for the US at nineteen. Adichie graduated summa cum laude from Eastern Connecticut State University with a degree in communication and political science, and subsequently received a master's in creative writing from Johns Hopkins and a master of arts in African history from Yale. Adichie's work has been translated into over thirty languages. Her first novel, Purple Hibiscus, won the Commonwealth Writers' Prize, and her second novel, Half of a Yellow Sun, won the Orange Prize, now the Baileys Women's Prize for Fiction. In 2008, Adichie earned a coveted MacArthur "Genius Grant" Fellowship. Her novel Americanah received the US National Book Critics Circle Award and was named one of the New York Times' Top Ten Best Books of 2013. Adichie's 2009 TED Talk, The Danger of a Single Story, is one of the top-ten most-viewed TED Talks, with over five million views. Her 2012 TED talk, We Should All Be Feminists, was published as a book in 2014. Her most recent book is Dear Ijeawele, or a Feminist Manifesto in Fifteen Suggestions.
