## Dear \_\_\_\_\_,

We all have come a long way since our class arrived on campus in September 1966. We are looking forward to our 50<sup>th</sup> Bowdoin Reunion next year and we hope you will celebrate with us on **May 28-May 31, 2020.** It promises to be a wonderful time to reconnect with classmates and the College. Although May 2020 still may seem far off, preparations for our 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion already are underway.

The Reunion Committee met on campus last month and is off to a great start organizing the weekend, creating the special Class of 1970 yearbook, and putting together a significant class gift. The Reunion Committee will be in touch between now and Reunion with information about our class gift and Reunion weekend activity updates.

Bowdoin provided us a fantastic liberal arts education and a multitude of life-long friendships. Our 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion affords us the chance to demonstrate our gratitude by helping current and future Bowdoin students enjoy the same opportunities we did.

Our 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion Gift, as described in the enclosed information, will consist of the total of: (1) gifts made since our 45<sup>th</sup> Reunion, (2) gifts received this academic year prior to June 30, 2020, and (3) pledges made by June 30, 2020 and completed before June 30, 2024.

We hope that you will consider one or more of the following types of gifts as you plan your 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion commitment:

<u>Alumni Fund gifts</u>, for current expenditure, to help maintain the quality of Bowdoin's current academic and for student life programs. They are our highest fundraising priority and determine our class participation rate. At our 55<sup>th</sup> Reunion we achieved a 65% participation rate, our highest to date. This year we are seeking to set a new record for our class (if not for the College) and will look to <u>everyone</u> for participation and support.

<u>Endowment gifts</u> ensure the long-term stability of the College and may be funded with a range of assets and gift types. Endowment gifts of any amount may be directed to one of Bowdoin's existing 1,700 endowed funds, such as the **Class of** 

**1970 Scholarship Fund**. A new endowed fund can be established with a minimum gift of \$100,000, which can be funded over several years.

<u>Life income gifts</u>, such as a charitable gift annuity or a charitable remainder trust provide attractive benefits for donors. Charitable Gift Annuities (CGAs), for example, provide fixed payments for life, backed by the assets of the College. If you itemize your taxes, a portion of your gift will generate a charitable deduction under current federal law. Of particular benefit to many donors is that CGAs

provide a tax-efficient way to transform appreciated equities into a steady, predictable income stream. The process to establish a CGA involves a simple, one-page agreement; the minimum gift amount is \$10,000. Please see the enclosed CGA sample illustrations for details.

**Estate plan gifts** provide support to Bowdoin in years to come. Estate plan provisions that are established and documented by June 30, 2020 will be counted toward Reunion giving along with outright gifts as part of our total 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion gift. Please consider how the College might play a role in your long term philanthropic and financial plans.

As mentioned earlier, the committee is asking all classmates to consider a gift and multi-year pledge to the Alumni Fund, as well as to the endowment, either outright or through a life-income gift.

## A member of the committee will be calling you in the coming weeks to talk about our 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion Weekend plans and our Yearbook, and to discuss a 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion gift.

The Class of 1970's support is vitally important to Bowdoin, and we hope you will think creatively and generously as you remember the College. Thank you for being part of Bowdoin's tradition of excellence, and be sure to join us and our classmates at what, without a doubt, will be a fun and memorable Class of 1970 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion in June.
