A NEW ERA FOR RUSSIAN STUDIES AT BOWDOIN

With the hiring of Associate Professor Alyssa Dinega Gillespie to chair the Russian Department in fall 2016, the department entered a new and exciting era. Professor Gillespie came to Bowdoin from the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana, where she had worked for 17 years as a professor of Russian language and literature and as co-director of the Program in Russian and East European Studies. She brought to Bowdoin her energy and creativity, her commitment to students, her teaching expertise on a wide range of topics, and her program-building experience. During the past three years she has worked tirelessly to rebuild and reinvigorate Bowdoin's Russian Department, with great success. In the pages that follow, we report on many of the changes that have come to the department during this time.

A THRIVING DEPARTMENT

SENSE OF COMMUNITY STRONG AS INTEREST GROWS

The Russian Department is still the kind of friendly and intimate place where faculty and students might grab the occasional informal meal or coffee together, just because they enjoy one another's company. Nevertheless, the department is on the move. With 15 students now majoring and 2 students minoring in Russian, and with a total of 44 students enrolled in spring 2019 in two courses taught in translation (Modernity and Barbarism and Post-Soviet Russian Cinema), the sense of excitement around Russian Studies on Bowdoin's campus is palpable. Along with the increase in student numbers has come a set of new departmental traditions: the social ice cream durina Orientation, which serves to students into recruit new

Russian language courses, now doubles as a reunion for upperclass students; at our holiday potluck party in December and our spring dessert party in May, Russian language students of all levels sing songs, recite poems, and perform skits; at our annual Russian department dinner in March, we enjoy a fancy catered Russian meal while celebrating our close-knit community.

STUDENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The past three years have been marked by notable student achievements. In the three years Bowdoin has participated in the ACTR National Post-Secondary Russian Essay Contest, four students have won five recognitions: Jae-Yeon Yoo '18 (honorable mention, Level 3), Augustus Gilchrist '20 (silver medal, Level 4), Artur Kalandarov '20 and Dalia Tabachnik '21 (honorable mentions, heritage category), and Dalia Tabachnik repeated her success this year with a bronze medal. Other national honors our students have brought home include the Fulbright-Hays Fellowship for the ACTR Russian Language Program in Moscow (Laura Howells '20)

and the American Mathematical Society Scholarship for the Math in Moscow program (Sam Swain '18). Artur Kalandarov, Laura Howells, and Augustus Gilchrist have also all won prestigious fellowships to support summer research or unfunded internships over the past 3 summers. Augustus is the recipient of the Surdna Foundation Undergraduate Research Fellowship for summer 2019; his project is titled "'The Happiness that Redeems the Bitterness of Previous Pages': Mikhail Zoshchenko and the 19th-Century Russian Canon." Laura and Artur are both recipients of the McKeen Center's Bowdoin Public Service



Fellowship; Laura is serving as a research assistant on U.S.-Russia-Europe relations at the Brookings Institution and is also doing data analysis work on Russian Presidential Grant Funding at the Institute for European, Russian and Eurasian Studies at George Washington University, while Artur holds an Internship at the Cohen Group, a consulting firm in Washington, DC.



About Our Faculty

Alyssa Dinega Gillespie

Dr. Gillespie (Associate Professor and Department Chair) is a specialist on Russian poetry of the 19th and 20th centuries; her research interests include the poetry of Tsvetaeva, Mandelstam, Pasternak, and Pushkin; gender issues in Russian literature; poetic mythmaking; and the creative psyche of the poet. She is the author of A Russian Psyche: The Poetic Mind of Marina Tsvetaeva (2001), published in Russian as Марина Цветаева: По канату поэзии (2015), and the editor of Russian Literature in the Age of Realism (2003) and Taboo Pushkin: Topics, Texts, Interpretations (2012). She has also received several awards for her work as a translator of Russian poetry. Her current projects include two books on Pushkin and a book-length translation of Tsvetaeva's selected verse.

Reed Johnson

Dr. Johnson (Lecturer) received his MFA and PhD from the University of Virginia, where he wrote his dissertation on how the writings of modernist author Sigizmund Krzhizhanovsky illuminate critical shifts in Soviet conceptions of time. His research interests in 20th- and 21st-century prose straddle the intersections of art and ideology. Dr. Johnson is the author of several essays, translations and works of fiction and has published in The New Yorker, The New England Review, Gettysburg Review and elsewhere. He lived in Russia for 8 years before completing his graduate education; he begins his appointment at Bowdoin in Fall 2019.

Student Research

Stephen Pastoriza '19 completed an honors thesis for his Russian major titled "Images of Women in the Works of Ivan Turgenev and Aleksei Kharlamov." This project grew out of Stephen's interest in the painting Young Woman and Child by Kharlamov (1840-1925) that is owned by the Bowdoin College Museum of Art (and currently on display in the galleries). The project breaks new scholarly ground in the understanding of the relationship between the novelist Turgenev and the painter Kharlamov, and of the implications of this relationship for the two men's respective creative works. In particular, Stephen draws attention to the role of the visual arts (painting especially) in Turgenev's fiction and creative process. Stephen's thesis advisor was Professor Alyssa Gillespie.

Zoe Shamis '19 completed a senior thesis for her Government and Legal Studies major titled "Sharp Power and the Transformation of Russian Foreign Policy. Zoe's advisor was Professor Laura Henry.

Laura Howells '20 spent summer 2018 researching women's NGOs and contemporary Russian civil society. Based on this research, she published a substantial article in the Bowdoin Review in April titled <u>"Inequality and State</u> Influence in the Russian Third Sector." Laura's faculty mentor was Professor Laura Henry.

Artur Kalandarov '20 published an article titled <u>"Soviet Germans and Soviets Living in Germany</u> <u>during the Second World War"</u> in the Armstrong Undergraduate Journal of History. This research was undertaken with the mentorship of Professor Page Herrlinger.
