# A BRIEF GUIDE TO FOOTNOTE CITATIONS IN HISTORY: Notes and Bibliography system

*Note*: If a book or article is available in more than one format, cite the format you consulted. For accuracy in citing sources, print formats are preferred. You do *not* need to indicate that you consulted a source in print (that is the default format) or a digitized version of a print edition. For books or journal articles consulted online which are *not* digitized versions of a print edition, provide a URL (include an access date only if the text can be altered). For an informal essay, if no fixed page numbers are indicated, provide a section title or a chapter *and* a paragraph number to locate the citation. For research papers, you must cite a page number for all sources.

Full references (all of the information that you might need to include, although for many sources, you will only need to include the \* items):

#### Book:

\*Author's full name [as presented on the title page]

[NOTE: if the author of the book is actually the editor of a collection, then write: author's name, ed., or author and author, eds. if the book has more than one author]
\*Complete title of the book (either in *italics* or <u>underlined</u>)
Editor, compiler, or translator, if any [this is an individual who is not the author]
Name of series in which book appears, if any, and volume or number in the series
Edition, if other than the first
Number of volumes
\*Facts of publication – city where published: publisher, date of publication
Volume number, if any
\*Page number(s) of the particular citation

FOOTNOTE FORMAT:

- first citation:
  - Author [as presented; usually first name, middle initial, last name], *Title* (place: publisher, date of publication), page number(s). [NOTE: you do not need to write p. or pp. before the page numbers]
- subsequent citations:

Author [last name only], *shortened title*, page number(s).

[NOTE: the shortened title might give the first part of the title or key words from the title] a citation immediately following a previous citation:

*Ibid.*, page number.

[NOTE: when working with multiple sources, do not use *Ibid*. unless you have finished revising and editing your essay. Otherwise, when you cut and paste a quotation and its reference mark, it might end up following a reference to a different source.]

#### "Article" in a Periodical or Newspaper:

\*Author's full name

[NOTE: for a newspaper article, include this if there is a byline]

\*Title of the article (in quotation marks)

[NOTE: for a newspaper article, give the headline, and subhead, if any]

\*Name of the periodical or newspaper (either in *italics* or <u>underlined</u>)

\*Volume (and number) of the periodical

\*Date of the volume or issue

[NOTE: for a newspaper article, give the full date]

\*Page number (s) of the particular citation

[NOTE: for a newspaper article, give the section, if any and page number]

### FOOTNOTE FORMAT:

first citation:

*Periodical*: Author [as presented, usually first name, middle initial, last name], "Title," *Journal* volume, number (date), page numbers(s).

Newspaper: Author [if a byline is listed], "Headline: subhead," Newspaper vol., number (day, month, year), section [if any], page number.

subsequent citations:

Author [last name only], "shortened title," page number(s).

a citation immediately following a previous citation:

Ibid., page number.

[NOTE: in this case, since the reference is to an article rather than a book, Ibid. is not italicized or underlined]

Unpublished Material:

\*Author

\*Title of document [or description of document], if any, and date

\*Folio number (or box number or other identifying specific)

\*Name of collection

\*Depository, and city where it is located

## A *primary source* or *primary document* reprinted in a Secondary Source or Edited Collection, or a *quotation* from another author, reprinted in a Secondary Sources or Edited Collection:

\*Full name of the author of the primary source

\*Complete title of the primary source (if it was originally published) OR a description of the text if it is unpublished

\*Facts of publication or origin (place, date)

\*Reprinted in:

[then list full citation for the source in which you found the text]

FOOTNOTE FORMAT:

#### first citation:

Author [as presented, usually first name, middle initial, last name], *Title* [or "Title"], (place:

publisher [if any], date), reprinted in Author(s) [first name initial last name], ed. [or eds.], *Title* (place: publisher, date of publication), page number(s).

subsequent citations:

Author [last name only of the author of the document], *shortened title* [or "shortened title"], page number(s).

a citation immediately following a previous citation:

Ibid., page number(s)

A primary source or primary document archived on a website:

- Begin the citation with the all of the bibliographic information for the original document (the website should include this information).
- Then: title of list/website, <internet address of the site>, [menu path for the particular source], date if provided.
